About tonight's Carol Service

Thank you for sharing in our celebration of Christmas. Whether you are with us in person or joining us online, we hope that tonight's carol service will help you to find some "comfort and joy", whatever Christmas may look like for you this year. The notes below are intended to help you follow the theme of the service.

Notes on tonight's carols and readings

The structure of the service is based on five readings from the Bible, interspersed with carols. The overall message is of hope for new life, peace and restoration for a broken world.

Readings: In the first reading, Adam and Eve's disobedience to God leads to their being banished from the Garden of Eden and the tree of life, a story that expresses the universal truth that human beings have strayed from God's ways. But there is hope of redemption, as Micah prophesies about the birth of the Messiah (2nd reading). Centuries later, God's plan begins to take shape through the obedience of Mary and Joseph (3rd reading), and Luke tells of the birth of Jesus and the visit of shepherds (4th reading). In the 5th reading, Matthew's account of the visit of the Magi shows how God's plan of salvation is for the whole world, not just the Jewish nation to which Jesus belonged.

Choir items: James MacMillan's *O Radiant Dawn* is a setting of an Advent antiphon which calls on Christ to shine his light on all whose lives are filled with darkness. *There is no rose of such virtue* is a modern setting of medieval words portraying Mary as a rose that contains the incarnate God. John Rutter's *Candlelight Carol* portrays the mystery and wonder of the story of Jesus' birth, while Dick Averre's *Christmas Hymn* tells the story from a shepherd's point of view. The journey of the Wise Men (aka "kings" is the subject of Peter Gritton's jazzy *Follow that star!* and the final choir item is the popular *O Holy Night!* by Adolphe Adam, setting to music J.S. Dwight's hymn of worship to the new-born King.

As you listen, may the Christmas message fill you with wonder, joy and hope!
