Rest and relaxation...

Having recently had a holiday, I have been pondering on the importance of rest and relaxation.

In today's fast-paced world, the art of relaxation can often feel like a distant dream. The pressures of work, family responsibilities, and the constant buzz of technology can leave us feeling overwhelmed and exhausted. Yet, amidst this chaos, finding moments of peace and relaxation is not only beneficial but essential for our well-being. The Bible offers timeless wisdom on the importance of rest and relaxation. COMPASSION

Our charity for July

Compassion is a charity that St Michael's has supported for a number of years whose mission is 'releasing children from poverty in Jesus' name'. *Compassion* is 3 C's:

Children – *Compassion* identifies children that are in poverty in 25 of the poorest counties in the world.

Church based – *Compassion* then identifies churches in those areas with a heart for children and partners with them to help those children with funds from sponsors in the UK and 12 other countries.

Christ based – the love of Jesus is central to everything *Compassion* does and is responding to God's call to care for the poor and show love to those in need.

Funds are obtained and used in two ways:

▶ one is from individuals sponsoring children, as a number in the St Michaels congregation do.

► the other way is through one-off gifts (such as St Michael's church gives) that are used to address various needs in the community – an example of which is give children like Disha safe water.



Eight-year-old Disha had little time for playing or studying. If she doesn't collect clean water, her family can't live.

"I don't like summer season," says Disha. *"It is the time when we have to make at least three trips to get water."*

In summer, it would take Disha up to three hours a day to collect enough water for her family. Disha's community in southern Bangladesh is known for its underwater mangrove forests, frequent flooding and threatening storms. But although there's water everywhere, it isn't safe to drink. That's why Disha's local *Compassion* project was determined to find a solution. Bringing clean, safe water closer to home improves health for everyone, but it's life-changing for children like Disha.

Now, thanks to the Water Purification Plant, made possible by Water Intervention funding, Disha doesn't have to walk three hours for water every day. Those three hours have been given back to her – so now Disha can spend time being a child, studying and playing with her friends. Whatever the season.

Compassion is very grateful for the continued support of St Michaels – thank you!

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CHANGES TO THE ADMINISTRATION OF HOLY COMMUNION

Thank you to all those parishioners who took the time to contact myself or John Castle about possible changes to the administration of holy communion.

During the Covid pandemic it was of course necessary to take suitable precautions to reduce the spread of the infection through many aspects of our lives with the sharing of the common cup being one of them. During this time St Michael's followed all the guidance from the Church of England to keep us all as safe as possible, and we are very grateful to the team of people who oversaw this.

Since early in 2022 Covid restrictions have been lifted and we have seen a gradual return to a 'normal' existence. In most churches this has meant a return to the common cup for holy communion, St Michael's being one of the last to change back to a shared cup.

The clergy and leadership team at St Michael's took the decision that we would not rush into change as there was still a general feeling of vulnerability, especially during the winter months when coughs and colds are more prevalent. So earlier this year we asked for your opinions and views about changing the way we administer holy communion. We deliberately didn't offer any initial thoughts as to how communion might be shared in the hope that we would get your uninhibited thoughts, which I'm happy to say we did.

Many people would still be wary about sharing a common cup, whilst others are happy to share. Most people don't want to see a return to the rail or kneeling. Everyone's thoughts and views were valuable and gave the Rector's Council and PCC a good starting point for discussion.

When making our decision about the change to administering holy communion we

were certain that we want everyone to be comfortable with the way they receive the sacrament. And whilst it is perfectly acceptable to receive holy communion in part, i.e. either the bread or the wine, we didn't want anyone to feel that this was their only option.

So we have come up with a plan which we will try in the hope that it works for everyone to receive holy communion in a way which suits them. We can adjust it if necessary, in the light of experience.

So, from the second Sunday in August (John Castle is not here for the first week), we will use the following format for all services including communion:

- All communicants and those receiving a blessing will queue down the nave as is current practice.
- When the choir is present, they will receive communion first from the nave altar.
- There will be two points of receiving on the front of the dias.
- In front of the pulpit one minister/assistant will have wafers and wine to intinct as is currently the practice. Communicants receiving from this side will go back to their seat via the North aisle.
- At the other end of the altar a second minister/assistant will have wafers with a communion assistant to administer wine from a shared cup. Communicants receiving from this side will go back to their seat via the South aisle.

[it is noted that this direction includes a step into and out of the bell tower. This is being addressed to avoid accessibility issues].

- Those taking communion in their seats will still be able to do so.
- Those seeking a blessing will be able to receive this either side.

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CHANGES TO THE ADMINISTRATION OF HOLY COMMUNION

Each member of the congregation will be able to decide on a week by week basis which way they would like to receive their communion. So, if you choose to share the cup most weeks but have a cold or sore throat one week you can decide to receive an intincted wafer as a one off then swap back when you are feeling better. Clearly making these changes will take some organisation and there are bound to be a few teething problems which we will aim to keep to a minimum. But, by introducing this change in August, we hope that by the time everyone is back for September there will be a core group who know what they are doing! Karen Allen, Churchwarden

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GROUPS FOR CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE



Baby and loddler lime is a friendly group for babies, toddlers and their parents/carers. It is held in the Pastoral Centre on the 2nd and 4th Thursdays of the month during school term time, from 9:00am to 11:00am.

For the first hour and half we have lots of toys for children to play with, toast and fruit (with coffee/tea for adults) and a craft activity. Breastfeeding support is also available (please ask at the welcome desk). In the last half-hour we have a Bible story and lots of singing of nursery rhymes etc. Booking is not necessary.

Kidz Church takes place on Sundays during the 9:30am service. It provides age-related activities in the Pastoral Centre, for children aged three up to school Year 5, every week. There is something for the *Kidz Church* age group all year round.
